PREPARING TO MEET **KING JESUS**

What do times of crisis and uncertainty compel us towards? They compel us to confront our own mortality, scrutinise our foundations and evaluate our purpose. Most of all, they compel us to seek the face of God.

As we sought the Lord, He assured us through these verses:

"And I tell you, you are Peter, and on this rock I will build My church, and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it. I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven, and whatever you bind on earth shall be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven." – Matthew 16:18-19 (ESV)

In these uncertain times, we can be rested in Jesus because He has promised that He Himself will build His Church and the gates of hell shall not prevail. The keys of the Kingdom of God are the preaching of the Gospel of Jesus Christ – His incarnation, death, resurrection, ascension and second coming. And we are to proclaim it! As the Church, it is our responsibility and privilege to do so. When people believe the Good News, they are able to enter God's Kingdom.

We are reminded of the charge that the Apostle Paul gave to Timothy as the spiritual leader of the church at Ephesus:

"I charge you in the presence of God and of Christ Jesus, who is to judge the living and the dead, and by His appearing and His kingdom: preach the word; be ready in season and out of season; reprove, rebuke, and exhort, with complete patience and teaching. For the time is coming when people will not endure sound teaching, but having itching ears they will accumulate for themselves teachers to suit their own passions, and will turn away from listening to the truth and wander off into myths." -2 Timothy 4:1-4 (ESV)

Hence, this year's spiritual burden is "Preparing to Meet King Jesus" make ready God's Kingdom people to prepare the world to meet King Jesus in eternity. The world is in darkness and pain. The task is urgent. We believe that we are now in the final hour. We have to prepare ourselves and others to meet King Jesus. This is really what the Church is all about.

How can we prepare ourselves to meet King Jesus?

A People Prepared for His Coming: Be Watchful!

In Luke 1:17, John the Baptist's calling was to prepare the people for the first coming of our Lord. Like him, we are called to prepare the people for Christ's second coming. We are to be watchful and persevere in prayer, so as to be ready for the coming of the Lord.

A People Prepared to Stand Firm and Take Action: Be Fruitful!

So let us stand firm in our calling as a church We have to prepare ourselves and others to meet King Jesus. This is really what the Church is all about.

A People Prepared in Personal Holiness: Be Faithful!

And He said to me, "Son of man, can these bones live?" EZEKIEL 37:3A (ESV)

IN THE HOME MISSIONS MINISTRY TO MIGRANT

guest workers, domestic workers and foreign professionals, the picture of "very many", "very dry" bones (Eze 37:2) represent the multitudes of migrants who need the life of God to enter them. They face daily challenges – no respect, little free time and no opportunities to improve their knowledge and skills. Most of all, without Jesus Christ, they have no hope of eternal life and glory.

Through the prophet Ezekiel, the Word of God promised hope to His people: "And I will put My Spirit within you, and you shall live, and I will place you in your own land. Then you shall know that I am the Lord; I have spoken, and I will do it, declares the Lord." (Eze 37:14). God's Spirit will come upon His people and give them life. He will turn their situation around and bring about a glorious reversal. Because God cares for and desires to bless His people.

In 2022, we look to God to do His great work among the migrant communities to give very many spiritually dead people new life in Jesus Christ! As the Lord has done great things in the past, we believe that He will do so again. God was the One who opened the door for our outreach work to migrant workers over the past two years. Hundreds of migrant workers were blessed by God's love through Covenanters during the COVID-19 pandemic. We provided food, care packages (necessities, disposable masks and hygiene products) and friendship. We visited them at their dormitories and chatted with them. We organised recreational activities, educational workshops and Christmas parties. We befriended them and invited them into our homes for meals. The befriending continues and more Covenanters are coming on board. On another front, our outreach to domestic workers is also gaining traction among the Indonesian and Filipino migrant communities.

As we work hard in both evangelism and discipleship, let us pray for the dry bones to be filled with God's Spirit, for the migrant workers to live and stand on their feet, "an exceedingly great army" (Eze 37:10), who will grow in spiritual maturity and multiply disciples while they are in Singapore and after they return to their home countries!

Pray for:

- 1. The guest workers, domestic workers and foreign professionals
 - a. That God will do His mighty, stirring work in their hearts to reveal their need for Jesus Christ
 - b. To develop friendships with Christian Singaporeans and be brought to a Christian community to hear and experience the Gospel
 - c. To be daily protected at work, have their well-being cared for during this pandemic, and be able to provide for their families back home

2. The leaders in Home Missions

a. To arise and lead strongly in evangelism and discipleship, and strengthen our four Fellowships to more effectively equip and produce disciplemakers

- b. To lovingly shepherd and care for our flock
- c. To faithfully teach the Word of God, disciple the people and model for them what it means to be authentic disciples and intentional disciplemakers
- d. To walk daily with God and practise self-care

3. Covenanters of all age groups

- a. That more of us will keep praying for and supporting this ministry
- b. That we will bring our domestic workers and invite our friends who are guest workers or foreign professionals to join the Fellowships
- c. That more of us will come and serve together in Home Missions

4. The working conditions in Singapore

- a. That employers will act justly and treat their workers with respect, kindness and care
- b. That the government will continue to improve the provisions for the welfare of migrant workers in our land

DEEPER REFLECTION

VERSES 1 TO 3 WOULD BE A FAMILIAR PORTION OF SCRIPTURE

to many of us. We remember how God first promised to bless Abram, who was later named Abraham. However, we often forget the condition of the promise and the purpose for the promise. The **condition** of God's promised blessings can be seen in verses 1 and 4. God began his dialogue with Abram thus: "Go..." (v.1). In the context, God gave Abram a command to leave everything that he knew, possessed and loved – from his country, his people and even his father' s household. Abram was to leave everything and go to an unknown place that God would reveal in His timing. In response to God's command to go, Abram believed God's promise, obeyed and went away (v.4). God said go and Abram went. **Obedience** was the condition of God's promised blessings. We see it explicitly mentioned by God in Genesis 22:18 – "...because you have obeyed My voice." The reason the nations will be blessed through Abram was because of his obedience to the voice of God.

As for the **purpose** for God's promised blessings, verse 2 tells us: "...so that you will be a blessing." Abram was blessed to be a blessing to **the nations** through the generations. We see in verse 3 and Genesis 22:18 that God's blessings (ultimately in Jesus Christ) are for all the nations. And that God's means of bringing His blessings to the nations are the generations of faithful men and women who, like Abraham, are obedient to the voice of God. Are you one of them?

DEEPER REFLECTION

IN THIS PASSAGE, WE SEE THE APOSTLE PAUL WRITING

tenderly to his spiritual son, Timothy. He addressed Timothy as "my beloved child" (v.2). Clearly, Paul had great affection for Timothy and likened their relationship to a biological father-and-son relationship. For some of us, when we think of discipling the generations, we think that the role belongs only to those who have offspring. But this passage shows us that discipling the generations is for all believers, regardless of whether the Christian has biological children. In Paul's view, he had served God with a pure conscience, just as his ancestors did (v.3). Their practice of sincere, genuine service to God seemed to have flowed to Paul, who was glad to carry on such a legacy. It seemed that Paul was very grateful to God that he could pass the baton, so to speak, to someone like Timothy. Now Timothy was the one to carry the torch and run with it in the next lap of faithful service to God.

The phrase "sincere faith" in verse 5 carries the notion of having no pretence or hypocrisy. As Paul thought about Timothy's sincere faith in Christ Jesus, he recalled that such faith first resided in Timothy's grandmother, then his mother and was evidently passed on to Timothy (v.5). What a godly relay race! Timothy's sincere faith was something both taught and caught, and his ancestors were instrumental in its transmission! Since the faith of the previous generations – whether in one's biological or spiritual family – can have a major impact on the lives of next generation believers, let us labour to make disciples!

DEEPER REFLECTION

IN VERSES 1 AND 2, THE PSALMIST CALLS EVERYONE ON

earth to praise and worship God. God is the eternal, creator God – the great I AM who rules over all the earth, indeed all of creation! How should people approach God to praise and worship Him? With hearts of gladness, gratitude and adoration (vv.2, 4). With songs in our hearts that break out in voices and instruments of God's praise! Because the Lord is good! God's goodness is manifested in His steadfast love and faithfulness – two enduring and unchanging attributes – towards His people (v.5). His steadfast love endures forever. His faithfulness endures to all generations. Human history has proved, is proving and will prove the truth of these declarations made by the Psalmist.

In verse 3, the Psalmist commands God's people to know that the covenant-keeping God of Israel is the God of creation. God is our Maker and we rightly belong to Him. In this blessed knowledge, we can find rest in God, fully satisfied and completely secure in His ownership, leadership and care over our lives. When we know whose we are, we will know who we are! Brothers and sisters, we can have deeply anchored peace and security when we truly know that we are God's own possession and God's beloved children through faith in Christ Jesus! Such peace and security can weather all storms and prevail through all turmoil and uncertainties. Let us therefore entrust ourselves and all generations of Christians to the Lord God, our Good Shepherd!

APPLICATION

What are two specific areas in my life that I need to learn to fear the Lord and obey Him?

PRAYER

Write a prayer to God as your response from your meditation on and application of the Scriptures.

DEEPER REFLECTION

PSALM 103 CENTRES AROUND THE HESED OF GOD. THE

Hebrew word *hesed* (vv.4, 8, 11, 17) has been variously translated in different versions of the Bible: "steadfast love" (ESV, NRSV); "love" (NIV, NLT); "lovingkindness" (NASB); and "loyal love" (NET). The essence of the word is the idea of covenantal faithfulness. Psalm 103 calls all God's servants to praise God because of His *hesed* shown to the individual and the community that fears Him and obeys His Word (vv.11, 17-18). The Psalmist contrasted the temporal nature of human life (vv.15-16) with the permanence of God's *hesed* (vv.17-18). The former is fleeting like grass and a flower in the field, whereas God's *hesed* is "from everlasting to everlasting" (v.17) for all those who fear Him. The gift of God's righteousness is passed down from generation to generation provided that the people keep His covenant and obey His commandments (vv.17-18).

Brothers and sisters, we must not just know the Word of God intellectually. We must live it out in the fear of the Lord! If we desire the next generation in our families and church to know God and make Him known in their spheres of influence, we must authentically live out our faith in daily obedience to the Lord our God. In this way, we help our next generation to "taste and see that the Lord is good" (Psa 34:8). They will in later years recall and declare, "The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases; His mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning; great is Your faithfulness" (Lam 3:22-23).



OBSERVATION

From this genealogy (vv.1-17), what significant observations can you make about the people in the generations that came before the birth of Jesus Christ?

APPLICATION

What personal doubts, fears or worries do I need to release to the Lord today and trust in His faithfulness to fulfil His promises?

PRAYER

Write a prayer to God as your response from your meditation on and application of the Scriptures.

DEEPER REFLECTION

THE GOSPEL ACCORDING TO MATTHEW BEGINS WITH

the genealogy of Jesus Christ from the time of Abraham.¹ This is because Matthew was writing with a Jewish audience in mind.² Right from the beginning, Matthew made it clear that Jesus was the longawaited Messiah prophesied about in the Old Testament. God had given Abraham the promise of great blessings,³ the fulfilment of which came through the person of Jesus Christ, who was from the line of Abraham and King David. Jesus the Messiah was the one who would bless all the nations of the earth through his life, death, resurrection and ascension. This royal genealogy included people of different ethnicities, backgrounds and social statuses. Both Jews and Gentiles were included. Further, the women mentioned in verses 3, 5 and 6 were considered scandalous persons in the society, yet God still used them for His glorious redemptive purposes.

Some of us may wonder how God could use us after what we have done in the past. Others may feel that our lives are out of control and that God is absent. Today's passage shows us that God's hand was at work in and through the generations, orchestrating His plans to bring them to fulfilment at His appointed time. Some parents among us may feel discouraged that our children are going down a different path and worried that they will not turn back to walk with the Lord. Our faithful, covenant-keeping God reminds us today that He is at work in every generation. Let us trust in the Lord, continually serve Him and do not give up!

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MONGod's Covenantal Promises07to Abraham's Descendants

SCRIPTURE Genesis 17:1-10; Jeremiah 31:31-34; 1 Corinthians 11:23-26

OBSERVATION

How did God reveal that His covenantal promises to Abraham (Gen 12:1-3) included the generations beyond (vv.7-10) and were also to be understood in the light of the new covenant (Jer 31:31-34; 1 Cor 11:25)?

APPLICATION

How does my understanding of the scope and nature of God's covenantal promises impact my decisions in life and ministry?



Lord God, please help me to see Your heart for the generations and to do my part to make known your covenantal promises in Jesus Christ to all generations. Help me not only to understand what Your covenant means for myself, but to embrace it and pass it on to the next generation as well. In Jesus' name, I pray. Amen.



DEEPER REFLECTION

GENESIS 17 MARKED A TURNING POINT IN GOD'S

covenantal promises to Abram (renamed "Abraham") in two ways. **First**, it was the first occasion that the covenant was extended to include Abraham's offspring. The covenant was not just between God and Abraham, but also between God and Abraham's offspring after him "throughout the generations" (vv.7, 9). In Genesis 12:2, God promised to make Abram into a "great nation". God told Abram that his descendants will be as countless as the dust of the earth (Gen 13:16) and as the stars in the sky (Gen 15:5). Just as God promised, Abraham had his own offspring who over time became a multitude of nations. God's everlasting covenant with Abraham and his descendants was for the purpose of a relationship with them ("to be God to you and your offspring after you", v.7).

Second, the command to keep God's covenant was not just directed to Abraham, but to his descendants as well (vv.9-10). All of them were to observe God's covenantal obligations (requirements), thereby keeping His covenant.

This turning point in God's covenantal promises to Abraham reflects a transition from understanding God's covenant as one made by God with Abraham, to a covenant made by God also with all subsequent generations of Abraham's descendants. The Bible makes clear that all people who have faith in God and His Son Jesus Christ are descendants of Abraham.⁴ God's will and purpose are for His covenant to be passed on from generation to generation. As believers in Christ, have we wholeheartedly committed ourselves to **pass on the knowledge of God's covenant to our own and subsequent generations**?

DEUTERONOMY 6 IS PART OF MOSES' SPEECHES GIVEN

to the next generation of Israelites before they entered the Promised Land. In verses 1 to 9, Moses exhorted them to fear, obey, worship and love God alone. The people were to hear and observe all the covenantal requirements that God had given them, and to pass them on to future generations. God's covenant with His people was to permeate family life in two dimensions. First, the knowledge of God's covenant was to be diligently passed on to future generations (v.7a). The Shema (vv.4-5)⁵ is central in this passage and reminded the Israelites about the exclusivity of God - God's people were to worship no one else and to love God with their whole being by being careful to obey all His commandments (vv.1-3, 6, 25). The Israelites throughout their generations were to remain devoted exclusively to the Lord their God and not be seduced by false gods. By uttering and teaching the Shema, the Israelites and their descendants repeatedly pledged to God their total allegiance, undivided devotion and full obedience. Christian parents bear the primary responsibility of diligently passing on to their children the knowledge of the new covenant of **the righteousness of** God through faith in Jesus Christ (Rom 3:21-26).

Second, the knowledge of God's covenant was to be **consistently taught throughout all of family life** (vv.7-9). From family devotions, mealtimes and bedtimes, to schooling, attending worship services and playing sports – everything was to be founded upon and interpreted through God's words. God's words were to be relevantly applied to every aspect of life and consistently shared at any given opportunity.

MARY'S SONG IS THEOLOGICALLY SIGNIFICANT. ITS

inclusion in this narrative reveals to us that the Gospel account was intended more to be a story to be heard than a history to be read. Mary's song carries for us two significant shifts that impact the way we view God's covenantal promises in relation to future generations. **First**, Mary's song reveals **a reversal of her social situation**, in that God has looked upon the "humble estate of His servant" and caused her to be counted "blessed" in the eyes of all future generations (v.48). This is the basis for declaring that God is merciful and pours out His grace on all, even the lowly, from generation to generation. Friends, how does this change our mindset about reaching out to and helping children and young people from poor families and marginalised communities in Singapore or our neighbouring countries?

Second, Mary's song tells of the fulfilment of God's covenantal

promises to the people of Israel, because the promised Messiah has come to provide salvation to God's people. As announced by an angel of the Lord to Mary's husband Joseph, "She will bear a son, and you shall call His name Jesus, for He will save His people from their sins" (Matt 1:21). God has fulfilled His covenantal promises given to Abraham, Isaac and Jacob. The birth of Jesus was the redemptive historical fulfilment of God's promised Messiah for His people – all those people throughout history, from every nation and generation, who believe in God's promised Messiah, Jesus. They are all considered Abraham's "offspring forever" (v.55) and are recipients of God's mercy through His Son.

DEEPER REFLECTION

PSALM 78 RECOUNTS THE STORY OF THE PEOPLE OF

Israel's persistent rebellion and unfaithfulness towards God and their redemption by the mercy and faithfulness of God. We will consider the first eight verses in two parts over two days to see what we can learn about passing on the Christian faith to the next generation.

Telling the next generation begins with us listening to God's redemptive story. The Psalmist began here with an exhortation to "give ear" and "incline our ears" to the "parable" that he was narrating (vv.1-2). Why did the Psalmist recount the history of Israel in this psalm? He did so to emphasise the theological significance of Israel's wilderness journey after the exodus from Egypt, highlighting negative examples of the past generation so that the present and future generations would know how they ought to follow the Lord their God. They were not to repeat their forefathers' sins of rebellion and disobedience against the Lord. The Psalmist desired that the future of Israel would be much better than the past.

By listening closely to God's redemptive story from the past generations, Christians living today can humbly learn precious historical lessons and then actively tell future generations the stories of God's works of power, righteousness, mercy and faithfulness. Let us carry out our responsibility to tell the next generation "the glorious deeds of the LORD, and His might, and the wonders that He has done" (v.4), especially through His Son Jesus Christ. Let us be bold and creative in telling the next generation the stories of God and His wondrous works, that they may walk faithfully with Him!

WHY DID GOD COMMAND HIS PEOPLE TO TELL THE NEXT

generation about His covenant and redemptive story in their lives? Verses 5 to 8 are instructive regarding God's purpose. The end goal of the preceding generation telling the next generation about God's story is "so that they should set their hope in God and not forget the works of God, but keep His commandments" (v.7). The next generation should not follow the examples of their forefathers, who were a "stubborn and rebellious generation", a people "whose heart was not steadfast, whose spirit was not faithful to God" (v.8). In other words, their hearts were not fully given to God and, consequently, they were repeatedly unfaithful to Him. When we tell the next generation about God, His covenantal requirements and redemptive love, we seek to teach them to put their hope in God who remains faithful to His people even when His people are unfaithful to Him, and to keep coming back to God and His Word. We encourage them toward a deeper trust in Jesus Christ, the Word of life (1 Jn 1:1-3)⁶. Further, we encourage them to remember the faithfulness of God in the lives of the generations past and in their own lives. The tendency for God's people, under pressure, to forget the many signs, wonders and glorious works of God in their lives, is evident in Israel's journey7. This forgetfulness results in rebellion and disobedience towards God. Remembrance is a key outcome that we desire from telling the next generation about God's story, so that they may continually trust, obey and be faithful to the Lord Iesus Christ.

12 **Loving Different Generations**

DEEPER REFLECTION

HERE, THE APOSTLE PAUL GAVE SEVERAL OVERARCHING

principles to Timothy on how he was to relate to the different generations in the church at Ephesus. Timothy was likely in his 30s when he started to care for and lead the church. First, Paul urges Timothy not to "rebuke" an older man (v.1). The Greek verb *epiplesso* has two spheres of meaning: (1) to strike upon, beat upon; and (2) chastise with words, to chide, upbraid, rebuke⁸. Referring to the latter sense, Paul urged Timothy not to use harsh words to "strike", chastise and correct an older man. Instead, Timothy was to "encourage" him (v.1). The Greek verb *parakaleo* means "to address, speak to (call to, call on), which may be done in the way of exhortation, entreaty, comfort, instruction, etc9." For ancient Jews, Greeks and Romans, elders were highly esteemed. Timothy was to treat older men and women with the honour and respect that he accorded fathers and mothers. This value is of timeless relevance and application, notwithstanding considerable challenges to its validity in the youth culture of many societies today. Second, Timothy was to relate to younger men and women like brothers and sisters, with the affection, respect and purity as was proper in such familial relationships. We must not despise or ill-treat younger men and women, just as we would not so do to our own brothers and sisters. Third, Paul commanded Timothy to not let his youth be despised by others. Paul reaffirmed Timothy's leadership by encouraging him to be an example to the believers from all the different generations that he is serving (1 Tim 4:12).

DEEPER REFLECTION

THE CHURCH IN PHILIPPI SENT SOME GIFTS TO PAUL WHILE

he was in Thessalonica (Phil 4:16), but "these were evidently inadequate for his needs, perhaps because the Macedonian churches suffered from 'extreme poverty' [2 Cor 8:1-2]"¹¹. In these circumstances, Paul "could have made demands" on the Thessalonians by asking them for money "as apostles of Christ" (v.6), which was his God-given apostolic right (1 Cor 9:14 – note "the Lord commanded"). But Paul chose "not [to] be a burden to any of you" (v.9). Instead, he put aside his rightful rights and "worked night and day" "in labor and toil" for his personal sustenance. Probably, Paul preached by day and worked by night¹² as a tentmaker (Acts 18:3). Paul was staying with Jason (Acts 17:5-7). He earned his living and "presumably paid Jason for his board and lodging"¹³, as he reminded the Thessalonians, "we did not eat anyone's bread without paying for it" (2 Thess 3:8). In this way, Paul showed the Thessalonians how he gave his own self to them as he proclaimed to them the Gospel (v.8).

Christian leaders can abuse God's Word, "Obey your leaders" (Heb 13:17), to assert their authority in a self-centred and autocratic manner. Self-centred husbands can likewise abuse God's command, "Wives, submit to your husbands" (Eph 5:22), toward their wives. The starting point in godly leading, in whatever setting, is giving ourselves to serve in love, and with this we will wisely put aside our rightful rights when it is necessary.

the faith of the Thessalonians, Paul did so "like a mother feeding and caring for her own children" (v.7, NLT) and "like a father with his children", exhorting, encouraging and urging them in their walk with God (vv.11-12).

There is no need to deduce from the two metaphors that Paul uses, that he is laying down a stereotype of sexual roles in the home: the mother feeding and the father teaching their children.¹⁴ In instructing fathers to "bring them [children] up in the discipline and instruction of the Lord" (Eph 6:4), Paul is not saying that this is solely the father's role and not the mother's - a way which we tend to take. Even in the patriarchal culture in Old Testament times, the call of wisdom is, "My son, keep your father's commandment, and forsake not your mother's teaching" (Prov 1:8). It is not healthy nor helpful in parenting to draw such clear lines regarding the father's and mother's roles. In parenting our children, it is wholesome that fathering and mothering are done in combining both the father's and mother's roles, and to do so in partnership as a team. I have observed over the years that many parents are not on the same page in parenting. And this results in conflicts between husband and wife, confusion for the children and division in the family. Parenting ought to be grounded on the foundational "one flesh" commitment of husband and wife (Gen 2:24).

being exemplary is most vital. What we say and do stand on what we are. When we fail badly in what we are, what we say and do can become meaningless. But then, perhaps, the only meaningful thing here is, sadly, we become a bad example for people not to follow.

Paul's conduct before the eyes of the Thessalonians was "holy and righteous and blameless" (v.10). "Holy" refers to "our being devout, pious and pleasing to God", "righteous" in "our dealings with our neighbours" and "blameless" in "our public reputation"¹⁵. Mark Paul's **confidence in his transparent authenticity**: "You are witnesses, and God also" (v.10). Concerning his working for his personal sustenance and not burdening the Thessalonians, Paul could confidently say, "You remember, brothers" (v.9). Paul would be presumptuous if he did not know for sure that the Thessalonians did remember this. "Educational theorists are fond of saying that we remember 20 percent of what we hear, 50 percent of what we see, and a greater percentage of what we hear *and* see."¹⁶ And "there is a broad consensus that visual memories are more lasting than audible memories"¹⁷. In our life and ministry, what do people remember us for?

Paul has this twofold confidence: His life has shown and is seen to be exemplary, and he can call people to follow his example. At the heart of Paul's ministry is: "Be imitators of me, as I am of Christ" (1 Cor 11:1), labouring "until Christ is formed in you" (Gal 4:19).

double-barrelled ministry: By example and by education. In forming Christ in people's lives (cf. Gal 4:19), it is example that gives weight to education. A principle I seek to apply in teaching and preaching is, "Preach from the heart and out of my life."

Paul's spiritual education in disciplemaking has three dimensions. Instructional dimension: "we exhorted you...encouraged you...charged vou..." (v.12). The Greek word for "exhort" could refer to "command (appeal, exhort, request, implore) or comfort (encourage, comfort, cheer up, console)"¹⁸. The word for "encourage" outside of Scripture "almost always has affective connotations, with the highly nuanced meanings of 'advise, encourage, console, comfort, speaking calm words to, appease and soothe"¹⁹. It speaks of "encouragement for those whose stamina is flagging"²⁰. The word for "charge" refers to authoritative imploring, requiring, insisting and urging, with strong emotion, that certain discipleship action be taken.²¹ There are overlaps in meaning for the three terms,²² which shows that in ministry, there must be a dynamic combination of exhorting, encouraging and charging, and also when to wisely give particular emphasis. Relational dimension: Paul had a very close relationship with the Thessalonians "like a father with his own children" (v.11). Personal dimension: "we exhorted each one of you" (v.12). Paul paid attention to and spent personal time with individuals. This was Paul's style. He did the same with the Ephesians during his three-year stay with them (Acts 20:31). The relational and individual dimensions require time, and thus underscore the priority of intentionally investing time in people.

Example 7 Living Life Worthy of God (1)

PAUL'S GOAL IN EXHORTING, ENCOURAGING AND IMPLORING

the Thessalonians was they "walk in a manner worthy of God" (v.12). It means then, that this also ought to be our goal in life. "Walk" speaks of "the way one conducts oneself – either [positively] before God or [negatively] in sin"²³. In seeking to live our lives **worthy of God**, it is helpful that we consider two other facts: **God is worthy** and **we are unworthy**.

God is the One who alone is worthy of anything. There will come the day when "the Lord alone" – no one else and nothing else – "will be exalted" (Isa 2:17). God and the Lamb are "worthy to receive" the sevenfold (symbolising completeness and fullness) "power and wealth and wisdom and might and honour and glory and blessing" (Rev 4:11; 5:12). On the other extreme end, we are unworthy of God. Jacob said to God, "I am not worthy of the least of all the deeds of steadfast love and all the faithfulness that you have shown to Your servant" (Gen 32:10). And Paul said of himself, "I am unworthy to be called an apostle" (1 Cor 15:9). Note that Paul was speaking in the present tense. He felt that way continually.

How then can we, who are unworthy of God, live a life worthy of God, who alone is worthy? It is "by the grace of God" (1 Cor 15:10). It is by God's saving grace through the blood of Christ and God's empowering grace through the Holy Spirit. There is no place for any sense of personal achievement.

DEEPER REFLECTION

TO "WALK IN A MANNER WORTHY OF GOD" IS TO "LIVE IN

a way that corresponds to the character and demands of God"²⁴, to live "the holy life, one that honours God in all its relationships and activities"25. Instead of giving a list of specific commandments to be obeyed, Paul sets before us "the goal of living in a way that is consistent with the nature of God"26. This presupposes that knowing God is a critical necessity. And we can truly know God in where He has revealed Himself: The Scriptures. And we also pray, that we "may be filled with the knowledge of His will in all Spiritual wisdom and understanding, so as to walk in a manner worthy of the Lord, fully pleasing to Him" (Col 1:9-10).

God "calls" us "into His own kingdom and glory" (v.12). "Calls" in the present tense indicates that it is an ongoing call.²⁷ This call is particularly significant and relevant to a discipleship context of suffering, which was that of the Thessalonians (1 Thess 1:6; 2:14). God's kingdom is "the kingly rule, the reign, the dominion and the sovereignty of God in the hearts of people"²⁸; and God's glory is God's presence (Exo 40:34-35). Both are present and future realities. So, we anchor in the present with an assured future. Because we are in God's "kingdom", we can have "patient endurance" in our "tribulation" "in Jesus" (Rev 1:9). And as "we rejoice in hope of the glory of God" (Rom 5:2), "the Spirit of glory and of God rests upon" us in our suffering (1 Pet 4:14).

DEEPER REFLECTION

PAUL "EXHORTED...ENCOURAGED...CHARGED" THE

Thessalonians to "walk in a manner worthy of God, who calls you into His own kingdom and glory" (2 Thess 2:12). **How** did Paul exhort, encourage and charge his new converts? **With the Word of God. Where** did Paul get the idea of living our lives worthy of God who call us into His kingdom and glory? **From the Word of God.** In Paul's disciplemaking and pastoring work, **the Word of God is central**. In 1 Thessalonians 1 and 2, the Word of God and the Gospel of God are synonymous, together occurring eight times.³⁰

Observe the nature and character of the Word of God. The Word of God is spoken and received "in power and in the Holy Spirit and with full conviction" (v.5), "in much affliction, with the joy of the Holy Spirit" (v.6) and "in the midst of much conflict" (1 Thess 2:2). The Word of God – and so are also those who trust in and hold fast to God's Word – is tested and tried by all opposition and obstacles but proves true and triumphs over them. The Word of God is so sacred that to be entrusted with it, our hearts must be tested and approved by God (1 Thess 2:4). The infinite worth and transforming power of the Word of God convinced and compelled Paul to serve with self-sacrificial love in his ministry of the Word (1 Thess 2:8, 9). There are two dimensions in our relationship to the Word of God: active and passive. Actively, we walk by God's Word; passively, God's Word "is at work" in us (1 Thess 2:13).

DEEPER REFLECTION

WHAT THE THESSALONIANS "HEARD FROM" PAUL, THEY

"received" and "accepted it not as the word of men", but "the word of God" (v.13). But what the Thessalonians "heard" were human words spoken by Paul. How then could they consider that "not as the word of men" but "the word of God" – and with the emphatic "what it really is"?

The nature of the ministry of the Word is shaped by the nature of the Bible, the Word of God given as divine revelation. "The Bible is the Word of God given in the words of men in history."³¹ That was how God gave us the Bible: "in the words of men" – the only way He can speak to us such that we can understand. Paul's letters in the New Testament are considered as "Scriptures" (2 Pet 3:15-16), which he wrote as he was "carried along by the Holy Spirit" (2 Pet 1:20-21) and are thus "God-breathed" (2 Tim 3:16). But they are all written in human words, nonetheless. So, when we read Paul's letters, we hear Paul's voice and God's voice through Paul's voice.

When we communicate in human words, thoughts, ideas and insights that are based on and built from the Scriptures, and we do so "not in persuasive words of [human and worldly] wisdom" (1 Cor 2:4), but by the power of the Holy Spirit with deep conviction (1 Thess 1:5), we are speaking the Word of God. Our speech can become "Scripturated" – influenced, formed and directed by the Scriptures – that we speak Scripturally, even without citing Scriptures. Jesus was like that.

DEEPER REFLECTION

WHEN WE RECEIVE THE WORD OF GOD THROUGH HEARING

it being preached or taught, or in our reading of the Scriptures, something happens. The Word of God "is **at work in you** believers" (v.13). We relate with the Word of God in two interlinked positions: active and passive. Actively, we **walk** by God's Word – through reading, hearing, understanding and applying it. Passively, the living Word of the living God **works** in our lives. But does God's Word work in our lives only at the point when we receive it – like, as we used to say quite commonly, "God spoke to me"?

Paul recalled for the Thessalonians the way they "received" and "accepted" God's Word when he was with them (v.13). That was something that happened in the past. However, Paul pointed out to them that this very Word of God "is at work" (literally, "works" – in the present tense) in them. The Word of God continues to work in our lives beyond the point when we received it. We emphasise doing the Word of God, which is critically necessary (Matt 7:24-27). But how conscious are we of the Word of God's doing in us? Our lives are changed when we apply the Word, it is not just because "we apply" the Word. This by itself can be rather anthropocentric. Our lives are changed because God applies His Word in our lives – God's Word "works in you" – as we apply His Word. Ultimately, it is God who changes our lives through His Word as He empowers us to live by His Word.

DEEPER REFLECTION

FOR THE THESSALONIANS, THE INDICATION OF THE WORD

of God "is at work in you" (v.13) was how they imitated God's churches in Judea in their suffering from their own countrymen (v.14). Suffering is an indication of the Word of God working in our lives. This doesn't make sense, does it? But this is what the Word of God tells us, however strange it may sound. This "strange" reality presupposes that we seek to live by the Word of God – as it was with the Thessalonians. And closely knitted to this kind of suffering is endurance. The Thessalonians suffered with "endurance inspired by hope" (1 Thess 1:3, NIV). Biblically, suffering and endurance go hand-in-hand, which are necessary for character development toward Christlikeness (Rom 5:3-4; Jas 1:2-3).

There is a trial that has been ongoing daily for a long time, and increasingly difficult, for my wife and I. As we seek to "not grow weary and lose heart" (Heb 12:3), we also at times ask, "How long, O Lord?" (Psa 13:1). Recently, I memorised Job 6:11-13: "What is my strength, that I should wait? And what is my end, that I should endure? Is my strength the strength of stones, or is my flesh bronze? Have I any help in me, when resource is driven from me?" This Scripture gives me the Word of God to speak to God about my struggles. But its power enables me to endure.

As we suffer with endurance by the Word of God, know that the Word of God is at work in us (see Rom 15:4).

FRIThe Darkened, Hardened25Human Heart

SCRIPTURE 1 Thessalonians 2:14-16a; Matthew 23:29-33; Genesis 12:1-3

DEEPER REFLECTION

IN NEW TESTAMENT TIMES, THE CHURCHES OF GOD IN

Judea suffered persecution from their fellow-Jews, who "killed both the Lord Jesus and the prophets", and opposed the proclamation of the Gospel (vv.14-15). These Jewish opponents pursued Paul from Thessalonica to Berea (Acts 17:5-10), and from Berea to Athens (Acts 17:10, 13-15). At this point of salvation history, only a minority of the Jews became followers of Jesus the Messiah. And even today, "secularism is becoming the unifying factor in Jewish identity...today the majority of the Jews worldwide identify themselves as secular rather than religious"³².

God had "come down" to "meet" Israel to reveal Himself personally to them (Exo 19:9-10, 16-20), having chosen them to be His channel of redemptive blessings to the world (Gen 12:1-3; 26:3-5; 28:13-14). But sadly, Israel had a long history of covenant unfaithfulness and "shedding the blood of the prophets" (Matt 23:29-33). Can one really reject God blatantly in the face of divine personal revelation, which is unmistakably true and real? God's faithful miraculous daily provision of "bread from heaven" can end up with "We loathe this worthless food!" (Neh 9:15; Num 21:5). The problem lies in the darkened, hardened human heart. Sometimes, we think that pre-believers received Christ because of our acts of love and unwittingly we take the credit. And note that "genuine coming to faith is never finally a matter of autonomous human decision"³³. Ultimately, it is "No one can come to Me unless it is granted by the Father" (Jn 6:64-65). This is the only hope for the darkened, hardened human heart.

DEEPER REFLECTION

SOME BIBLE SCHOLARS CALLED PAUL'S WORDS IN VERSES

15 to 16 "the Pauline polemic against the Jews"³⁵. Paul wasn't anti-Jew. When he went to Corinth, where he wrote to the Thessalonians, he first preached the Gospel to Jews (Acts 18:1, 5); and likewise, when he went to Ephesus from Corinth (Acts 19:1, 8). Paul himself was a patriotic Jew (Rom 11:1; 2 Cor 11:22). He longed and prayed for his fellow Jews' salvation (Rom 10:1) with such "great sorrow and unceasing anguish" as to declare that he was willing to forfeit his salvation if only thereby they might be saved (Rom 9:1-3). And yet, quite ironically, he seemed to conclude that God's "wrath has come upon them at last" because they have "fill[ed] up the measure of their sins" (v.16), as if they were a gone case. What kind of missionary mindset was that?

We must be wary of the danger of filling up the measure of our sins that leads to divine judgment. God's disciplinary judgment came upon "many" of the Corinthians in the form of weakness, illness and premature death (1 Cor 11:29-32). God's judgment came upon the Canaanites only "after four generations" from Abraham, because their sins "do not yet warrant their destruction" (Gen 15:16, NLT). God in "the riches of His kindness and forbearance and patience" gives people sufficient time to repent of their sins (Rom 2:4). We can never know when we cross the line in sinning that results in divine judgment. God determines that line. Let us carefully keep short accounts of our sins with God (1 Jn 1:9).

DEEPER REFLECTION

OPPOSITION FROM THE JEWS FORCED PAUL TO LEAVE

Thessalonica abruptly and his ministry of building the faith of his new converts was greatly disrupted (Acts 17:5-10). Feeling that he had not built their faith adequately, he longed greatly to see them again (vv.17-18). In his ministry, Paul sought to "**return** and **visit**" his converts "in **every city**" to "**see how they are**" and to **strengthen them in the faith** (Acts 15:36, 41; 16:5). Such was Paul's intense concern.

There was a time when Dawson Trotman, the founder of The Navigators, made it a rule in his life never to end his day without sharing Christ with someone;³⁶ and he had won many to Christ. One day, he made a shocking discovery when he shared Christ with a man. He was "one of his 'converts' whose decision had not been followed up and had virtually died on the vine"³⁷. Shaken, Dawson reasoned that there must be countless such persons who had sincerely received Christ, but whose lives had not been changed. Lost souls were saved but became lost again. From that time on, Dawson "resolved to follow up anyone he led to Christ – a work more difficult than winning souls"³⁸. Dawson said, "You can lead a man to Christ in 20 minutes to a couple of hours, but it takes 20 weeks to a couple of years to adequately follow him up."³⁹ Dawson began to put "less emphasis on getting the decision and more on growing up into Christ"⁴⁰.

Building the faith of new and young believers is highly critical.

DEEPER REFLECTION

PAUL'S FORCED DEPARTURE FROM THESSALONICA RESULTED

in a separation from his new converts, which he describes as "we were made orphans from you" (v.17a, NIV). Paul uses the word, *aporphanizō*, which means "to cause to be an orphan"⁴¹, to describe the "extremely painful"⁴² separation. Paul felt a great sense of loss, like a child who has lost his parents. We need to capture Paul's intense feelings, which shows how much the Thessalonians meant to him.

The separation was unbearable even though it had been only "for a short time". While being separated "in person", for Paul, it was "not in heart". Although they were separated physically, Paul carried the church in his heart and thoughts. It was out of sight, but never out of mind. In a similar vein, Paul said to the Philippians, "I hold you in my heart" (Phil 1:7), and to the Corinthians who had brought him many heartaches (cf. 2 Cor 2:1) he spoke of "the abundant love I have for you" (2 Cor 2:4) and the "earnest care I have for you" (2 Cor 8:16).

These intense emotions of Paul tell us the importance of people to him. Disciplemaking is not just a task to be done or a mission to be accomplished. It is essentially about building people's lives. Paul sees people as the **"interests...of Jesus Christ,"** and because of this we ought to be "genuinely concerned for the welfare" of people (Phil 2:19-21). How we sensitively feel for people and are consciously concerned about them is an indicator of the importance of people to us.

Irreplaceable Dynamics WED in Face-to-Face Contact

DEEPER REFLECTION

PAUL'S DEEP SENSE OF LOSS LIKE AN ORPHANED CHILD

in his "extremely painful"⁴³ separation from the Thessalonians (v.17a) resulted in a great longing "to see you face to face" (v.18). Paul uses "highly emotive"⁴⁴ words to describe his loss and longing. Note the attitude and action of Paul in seeking to see the Thessalonians face to face. He "endeavoured the more eagerly" to see them again. The verb for "be eager", spoudazō, is an intensive word. It means "do one's best, spare no effort, work hard"⁴⁵, eager to do something with readiness to expend energy and intense effort.⁴⁶ The intensity of Paul's eagerness is intensified further by the expressions "more abundantly" and "with great desire" (v.17). And with this attitude, Paul "wanted to come to you" with many attempts - "again and again", until it became clear to him that it was impossible (v.18).

Paul's intensive attitude and action underscores the significant importance of face-to-face contact and communication in life and ministry. God created human beings to be personal and relational beings, with personal face-to-face contact and communication in relationship - with God and fellow human beings - as vitally essential. It has certain living life-to-life dynamics that cannot be replaced by technology. A good example is sexual intimacy. We can communicate through technology without relating interpersonally. God's most definitive self-revelation in "the Word became flesh and dwelt among us" (Jn 1:14) was a face-to-face contact with His creatures, where He could be heard, seen, gazed at and touched personally (1 Jn 1:1-2).

A CHURCH MAY AT THE END OF A YEAR REPORT ON THE

number of pre-believers who received Christ through its personal and congregational evangelistic efforts. But does that church check on the number of these new believers who remain in the faith, how are they being discipled and who are those who have fallen away? We can safely assume from Paul's close relationship with the Thessalonians, and his desire and attempts to reconnect with them after being forced to leave them abruptly, that he had such concerns. And this would be especially so when Paul recognised the reality of spiritual warfare in disciplemaking.

Satan is mentioned twice in 1 Thessalonians, which point to two battlefronts in spiritual warfare in disciplemaking. **Discipleship battlefront:** The Thessalonians in their young faith were suffering affliction and Paul felt that he had not adequately built their faith. So, he was fearful in his absence from them that "the tempter" might have "tempted" them (1 Thess 3:5), they were "being shaken by the troubles you are going through" (1 Thess 3:3, NLT) and fell away from the faith. A very critical disciplemaking curriculum is suffering in discipleship. **Disciplemaking battlefront:** Paul made attempts to return to Thessalonica "again and again", but to no avail, because "Satan hindered us" (v.18). The Greek word for "hindered" applies to "breaking up a road to render it impassable"⁴⁷. When we fail in committing ourselves to disciple new and young believers, we may have already lost in the disciplemaking battlefront without being "hindered" by Satan.
